A Note From Fr. Larry

Special Request from Me about the 2020 Annual Catholic Appeal: You know from recent bulletins, blast emails, and from my pulpit announcements that the 2020 Annual Catholic Appeal is far from over. The good news is that, thanks to the generosity of 119 donors, HNJ parish has recently met its Diocesan goal. This sets the stage for all additional dollars pledged and paid (i.e., “over goal dollars”) to come back to Holy Name parish where we use them (as we have in past years) to pay down our still-large debt. The bad news is that we are still 102 donors and \$55,060 short of where we were in 2019. I cannot ignore that difference. Failure to reduce it promptly will have a very negative impact on parish finances.

This week, I am mailing an original letter from me to each of the 2019 ACA donors who have not yet made a pledge to the 2020 Appeal. In the letter, I ask that they make a pledge to this year’s Appeal if they can (understanding that this is a difficult time for many.) If you receive one of those letters from me, please make a pledge.

Scripture Insights

*Please consider the following commentary on this Sunday’s readings
([1 Kings 3:5, 7-12](#); [Romans 8:28-30](#); [Matthew 13:44-52](#))*

“Paul’s words in Romans 8:28-30 are best understood when read within the context of the verses before and after them. The surrounding verses lead us to understand God’s goodness and generosity.

After the gift of kingship, God further offers Solomon the freedom to ask for any gift he desires. The contrast that the text highlights in terms of what Solomon did not request (namely, longevity, wealth, or his enemies’ demise) suggests that his choice of gift is impressive because of both its content and its objective. He wants a wise, discerning, and understanding mind to govern the people. He wants something for the public good and not something solely for himself. Because of Solomon’s good choice, God ends up giving to him even other gifts that Solomon did not name.

Psalm 119, in a sense, affirms Solomon’s choice by presenting God and God’s teaching, not wealth, as the psalmist’s choice. The psalmist further explains that God’s Word is what gives understanding.

The parables in today’s reading from Matthew are also about choices and whether we have the discernment to choose wisely. Such choices, according to these parables, may involve the giving up of other valuables and often incur sobering consequences.

- What examples would you give to illustrate God’s goodness and generosity?
- What single gift would you request of God to bring about the greatest public good?
- Psalm 119:130 presents God’s Word as giving understanding, but God’s Word (for example, parables) are often difficult to understand. What do people need to do to better interpret, discern, and understand what they find in the Bible?”

MEMORIAL OF ST. IGNATIUS OF LOYOLA - JULY 31

On July 31, we celebrate the Memorial of St Ignatius of Loyola, who was a model for positive change. Born into nobility in 1491, Ignatius spent his youth at the Royal Court, first as a page, then as a knight. He loved military exercises, had a great desire for fame, and often indulged in immoral and questionable behavior. During the war between France and Spain, Ignatius sustained grave injuries to both of his legs. During his recovering, he read the only material available, a book about the life of Christ and one on the lives of the Saints. Ignatius was especially drawn to the Monks, like St. Francis of Assisi, who devoted their lives to the Service of God.

Ignatius went through a spiritual conversion and felt a strong desire to become a priest. He examined his conscience, confessed his sins, and gave his fine belongings to the poor. Instead of immediately seeking admission to a seminary, however, he spent years studying theology in order to gain a better understanding of what was needed of him as a priest. During his studies, he wrote the Spiritual Exercises. Several of his fellow students believed in what he wrote and became his followers.

Ignatius and his followers took vows of Poverty, Chastity and Obedience on August 15, 1534. They were ordained priests in 1537 and, three years later, Pope Paul III officially approved the new Order. This was the beginning of the Society of Jesus – The Jesuits. The *Spiritual Exercises* became the foundation for all its members but, because it was not yet approved by the Pope, Ignatius was charged with heresy. He was ultimately found innocent, and won praise for the renewal his new Society brought to the Church.

Ignatius is a great example of how perseverance can change a life. He brought positive change to the Church with the founding of the Society of Jesus. We can do the same. How? By offering all our tasks, big or small, to Jesus and by performing them to the best of our ability.
