

HNJ CHURCH NOT IN ANY RESTRICTED ZONE

REMAINS OPEN FOR MASSES, PRAYER AND OTHER SACRAMENTS

NY State and City have this week designated Red, Orange and Yellow COVID Zones and imposed additional restrictions on houses of worship in those zones. The Diocese of Brooklyn is monitoring this situation closely and may initiate litigation to better protect religious freedom.

The good news for us is that, as of this writing, Holy Name of Jesus is NOT in any of the zones. HNJ Church remains OPEN for our full Mass and prayer schedule. The Church also remains OPEN for Funerals, Baptisms and Weddings.

All of the recent attention to this reminds us of the continuing importance of remaining extra careful about observing all COVID guidelines concerning social distancing, masking, hand-washing and staying home if you do not feel well. Thank you all for your ongoing cooperation to help us continue to remain OPEN.

It is our pleasure to welcome them as our parish's newest Catholic Christians and to congratulate their parents, godparents, grandparents, and loved ones for bringing these two beautiful children into God's family.

This year we observed the Memorial of St. Francis of Assisi in two ways. On Friday, October 2, Fr. Cezariusz Jastrzębski, a fine young priest from nearby Our Lady of Czestochowa Parish and I had the pleasure of blessing the stuffed animals of the Pre-K 3, Pre-K 4, and Kindergarten students at St. Joseph the Worker Catholic Academy. (OL Czestochowa is one of the five nearby parishes aligned with SJWCA). On Sunday afternoon, October 4 (the actual date of the Memorial), I blessed live pets in HNJ School Yard. Many thanks to all who helped with these two enjoyable events.

Next Sunday, October 18, is World Mission Sunday, the theme for which this year (as directed by Pope Francis) is "Here I Am, Send Me". To "send" ourselves, we can: PRAY for the Church's worldwide mis-

sionary work, and OFFER financial HELP and CHARITY through the collection to be taken up next Sunday for the Society for the Propagation of the Faith to support mission activities in vulnerable communities throughout Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific Islands.



SCRIPTURE INSIGHTS

*Please consider the following commentary on this Sunday's readings:
([Isaiah 25:6-10](#); [Philippians 4:12-14, 19-20](#); [Matthew 22:1-14](#))*

"The parable of the wedding feast is the final of three parables [The first two were the Parables of the Two Sons and of the Tenants in the Vineyard, which were the Gospels of the last two Sundays.] Jesus addressed to the Jewish leaders. He likens the Kingdom of Heaven to a king giving a lavish banquet, a motif often associated with heavenly fulfillment. As with other parables, allegorical interpretation may highlight the significance of the symbols for Jesus' audience, as well as Matthew's.

The king of the parable is God, who has planned a celebration for his Son, Jesus. The servants sent by God are the prophets of Israel. Two times God sends out the invitation, clearly expecting people to come to the feast. The first time, people simply refused. At the second invitation, we hear more specifics about their declining: too distracted; too occupied. Refusing the king for such paltry reasons is bad enough, but the worst is killing the messengers, the prophets sent by God. Enraged, the king punishes those whose actions are tantamount to rebellion. Matthew's audience may see this as a reference to the destruction of Jerusalem.

Still, the feast must go on, so the king invites everyone who can be found — the bad and good alike. The seeming illogic of a man punished for not having a wedding garment when he was just recently pulled off the street reminds us of the allegorical character of the parable: exaggeration, inconsistency, and shocking details nudge us to look for possible symbolism. The wedding garment may indicate righteousness or faith or good works. "Being clothed in Christ" is an early way of describing Baptism. Having no wedding garment suggests someone who initially responded to God's invitation, but did not continue life in Christ. Matthew's audience could well ask themselves if they are living with or without a proper wedding garment.

The final verse summarizes the meaning of the parable for Jesus' audience, for Matthew's, and for us. Many (in the biblical idiom, 'many' signifies 'all') are called by God's widespread invitation. Few, however, choose to accept the invitation, or accept it only partially and temporarily."

ST. TERESA OF AVILA - OCTOBER 15

Thursday, October 15, is the Memorial of St. Teresa of Jesus, or Teresa of Avila. She is one of four women Doctors of the Church. She lived in Spain in the 1500s, worked with St. John of the Cross, was a poet and mystic and an advocate for reform.

One of the things she is most well-known for is her simple poem or prayer "Nada te turbe" ("Let Nothing Disturb You") which has been translated as: "Let nothing disturb you, nothing frighten you. All things are passing. God never changes. Patience obtains all things. Whoever has God lacks nothing. God is enough."



ST. MARGARET MARY ALOCOQUE - OCTOBER 16

From stained glass windows to tattoos, the Sacred Heart of Jesus has been an enduring, powerful symbol to many people from all walks of life. In the 17th century, particular attention to the heart of Jesus began to be promoted.

St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, a French Visitation nun, had a special tenderness for Jesus' Sacred Heart and often shared her prayers and visions of it. In the heart of Jesus — imaged as pierced with thorns, flames, and a cross atop — she experienced the burning love of Christ for all people and the trust that Jesus held all of our joys and suffering in his heart. With Margaret Mary, what joys and sufferings might we entrust to the Sacred Heart of Jesus?
