

A NOTE FROM FR. LARRY

IMPORTANT: This is the weekend when the obligation to attend Sunday Mass resumes, unless there is a serious reason for not attending (e.g., being sick yourself, caring for a sick person, or having serious underlying conditions that make you susceptible to getting sick). We look forward to seeing many people at Mass this weekend.

Stella Marie Barbieri was baptized in Holy Name of Jesus Church on May 29. I had the privilege of marrying baby Stella's parents, Joseph and Antonella Barbieri, in 2017, and of baptizing Stella's brother Joseph in 2018. We wish all of God's blessings upon and our best wishes to Stella, her parents, her grandparents, and all her loved ones.

Memorial Day weekend was observed in Holy Name of Jesus Parish in two special ways. Despite the heavy rain on Saturday, the Scouts of Holy Name Parish, along with several adult leaders and parents, placed American flags at the Green-Wood Cemetery graves of hundreds of men and women who had served our country in several different wars. The scouts also placed flags near the Memorial Plaques at the base of the trees around the perimeter of the HNJ parish campus. These plaques memorialize several service members from the Park Slope/Windsor Terrace area who died in action during World War I. It was a wet but rewarding day during which the Scouts had the opportunity to learn and to serve.

On Memorial Day, Monday, May 31, the members of the McFadden Post attended the 9 a.m. Mass at Holy Name. After Mass, I blessed a wreath which the Post Members placed beneath the Crucifix in the grotto outside the Church. They then formed a small parade and marched with a police escort to the War Monument at Bartell-Pritchard Square where they placed another wreath. Later in the day, they completed a Memorial Day flag ceremony outside the Post.

This Sunday, June 6, is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus Christ (Corpus Christi). We will have a brief Corpus Christi Eucharistic Procession at the end of the 10:30 a.m. Mass on Sunday. Please see the longer item about Corpus Christi at the end of this Note.



WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR THE SANCTIFICATION OF PRIESTS

The World Day of Prayer for the Sanctification of Priests will be celebrated by the universal Church on June 11, 2021. Occurring annually on the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, the World Day of Prayer for the Sanctification of Priests was established by Pope St. John Paul II in 2002 and encourages priests to reflect upon the importance and dignity of their vocation.

Bishop James F. Checchio of Metuchen, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Clergy, Consecrated Life, and Vocations echoed Pope Francis' gratitude for priests during this time of pandemic. "We give thanks to priests who are continuing to serve the people of God in this challenging time. Priests are the face of Christ and allow people to encounter Jesus, especially through the celebration of the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Reconciliation. On this World Day of Prayer for the Sanctification of Priests, I encourage my brother priests to contemplate with gratitude the great gift Jesus has given us in our vocation. I ask the faithful to pray for all priests that they may be filled with joy and strength as they continue their important work of shepherding God's people." © USCCB

Friday, June 11, is the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. Saturday is the Memorial of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Please see the items about these days elsewhere in the bulletin. These two days would be especially good ones to join us for our 9 a.m. morning Mass. We will say the Liturgy of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Rosary after the Mass on Friday, and the Rosary after the Mass on Saturday.

The Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus is also the World Day of Prayer for the Sanctification of Priests. Please pray for all priests. We can certainly use your prayers.

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The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

On the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ, we give special honor to Jesus, truly present in the most Blessed Sacrament of the altar. As Catholics, we worship the presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist, both during Mass and outside of Mass. We are encouraged to spend time in prayer before the Lord in the Eucharist. Many parishes offer regular exposition of the Blessed Sacrament in a monstrance. We may also choose to visit the church at other times to adore the Blessed Sacrament reserved in the tabernacle.

Why does Jesus give himself to us as food and drink?

Jesus gives himself to us in the Eucharist as spiritual nourishment because he loves us. God's whole plan for our salvation is directed to our participation in the life of the Trinity, the communion of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Our sharing in this life begins with our Baptism, when by the power of the Holy Spirit we are joined to Christ, thus becoming adopted sons and daughters of the Father. It is strengthened and increased in Confirmation. It is nourished and deepened through our participation in the Eucharist. By eating the Body and drinking the Blood of Christ in the Eucharist we become united to the person of Christ through his humanity. . . . In being united to the humanity of Christ we are at the same time united to his divinity. Our mortal and corruptible natures are transformed by being joined to the source of life. . . .

By being united to Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in us, we are drawn up into the eternal relationship of love among the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. As Jesus is the eternal Son of God by nature, so we become sons and daughters of God by adoption through the sacrament of Baptism. Through the sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation (Chrismation), we are temples of the Holy Spirit, who dwells in us, and by his in dwelling we are made holy by the gift of sanctifying grace. The ultimate promise of the Gospel is that we will share in the life of the Holy Trinity. The Fathers of the Church called this participation in the divine life "divinization" (theosis). In this we see that God does not merely send us good things from on high; instead, we are brought up into the inner life of God, the communion among the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. In the celebration of the Eucharist (which means "thanksgiving") we give praise and glory to God for this sublime gift.

When the bread and wine become the Body of Christ, why do they still look and taste like bread and wine?

In the celebration of the Eucharist, the glorified Christ becomes present under the appearances of bread and wine in a way that is unique, a way that is uniquely suited to the Eucharist. In the Church's traditional theological language, in the act of consecration during the Eucharist the "substance" of the bread and wine is changed by the power of the Holy Spirit into the "substance" of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. At the same time, the "accidents" or appearances of bread and wine remain. "Substance" and "accident" are here used as philosophical terms that have been adapted by great medieval theologians such as St. Thomas Aquinas in their efforts to understand and explain the faith. Such terms are used to convey the fact that what appears to be bread and wine in every way (at the level of "accidents" or physical attributes—that is, what can be seen, touched, tasted, or measured) in fact is now the Body and Blood of Christ (at the level of "substance" or deepest reality). This change at the level of substance from bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ is called "transubstantiation." According to Catholic faith, we can speak of the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist because this transubstantiation has occurred (cf. Catechism, no. 1376).

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JUNE 11 - SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST SACRED HEART OF JESUS

The devotion to the Sacred Heart, which dates back centuries, includes consecrating oneself to, and benefiting from, the promises of the Sacred Heart. In honor of today's feast, consider committing to the following: Consecrate all your actions to glorify the Sacred Heart; consecrate all your weakness within the strength of the Sacred Heart; consecrate all your confidence in the faithfulness of the Sacred Heart. Do this and the peace of Christ, who is our peace, will be with you.

JUNE 12 - MEMORIAL OF THE IMMACULATE HEART OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

Yesterday we celebrated the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and today we commemorate the Immaculate Heart of Mary: two hearts on fire with love and made one in suffering. The Sacred Heart symbolizes the love of God for people, pierced by the thorns of rejection. The Immaculate Heart symbolizes the love of people for God, wounded with a sword of suffering in solidarity with Christ. Remembering that Jesus identified with the struggles of the least of our sisters and brothers, today we can pray for those refugees driven from their homes by violence and poverty and waiting for help at our southern border. 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Jesus' Sacrifice and Ours: In presenting the still-familiar four-fold "Shape of the Eucharist"—Jesus takes / blesses / breaks / gives (Mark 14:22)—Mark omits Matthew's specification of purpose "for the forgiveness of sins," and Luke's "for the remembrance of me." But Jesus does recall the covenant, Israel's liberation from Egypt's slavery. And could the disciples—or we—fail to recall that, in Mark's earliest verses, Jesus sits at table "with tax collectors and those known as sinners" (2:15)? Mark also emphasizes the Eucharist as our participation in Jesus' passion and pledge of our share in his future glory. Jesus had earlier referred to his disciples' suffering as "drinking from the cup he would drink" (10:38–39). Soon he would beg his Abba to "take this cup away" (14:36). But while sharing the Eucharistic cup, Jesus promises a day when he would "drink it new" (14:25): the cup of suffering and sorrow is not the last cup he—or we—will drink, the cup of the Garden of Agony will be transformed into the cup of the Kingdom of God. © J.
