A NOTE FROM FR. LARRY

Last Sunday, the team of skilled, hardworking parish volunteers who do this every year put up the exterior garlands and the sanctuary and Gathering Space (vestibule) Christmas trees (not to be lit until much later in Advent of course). This is a major effort requiring a good deal of work on extension ladders and physical hauling of heavy pieces. I shudder to think about what commercial contractors would charge, and I thank all of the faithful members of that team for gifting the parish with their time and talent in such a specialized way.

Our Advent schedule continues with Fr. Keeney's and Deacon Gerry Devine's third and final Advent Holy Hour at 7 p.m. on Monday, December 14 in the Church and on Facebook. Fr. Keeney's reflection will be on "The Hope of Simeon and Anna". We will have "the Music of Advent" from 4:45 PM to 5:15 PM in the Church on Saturday, December 19, and Reconciliation Monday with Confessions in the Church from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Monday, December 21. Especially see the flyer elsewhere in this bulletin about Reconciliation Monday. It has been difficult to get to Confession during the past several months, but we will be hearing Confessions in the Church (observing all safety protocols) for four hours that day.

The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Catholic Current provides us with the following concerning this weekend's Third Sunday of Advent or Gaudete Sunday: "On Gaudete Sunday, the season of Advent shifts its focus. For the first two weeks of Advent, the focus can be summed up in the phrase, 'The Lord is coming.' But beginning with Gaudete Sunday, the summary might be, 'The Lord is near.' This shift is marked by a lighter mood and a heightened sense of joyous anticipation. Liturgically, the colors lighten as well. The priest usually wears rose-colored vestments, a hue seen only on Gaudete Sunday [in Advent] and Laetare Sunday [in Lent]. On this day, we light the third candle of the Advent wreath, which is also rose-colored, or if you prefer, pink. The word 'Gaudete' is Latin for 'Rejoice.' In times when the focus of our anticipation is often on the negative and fearful, this celebration is a reminder that God who loves us is still in charge and we await his coming not with fear, but with tremendous joy".

The O Antiphons: The verses of the Advent Hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" and the Verses before the Gospel for the weekday Masses between December 17 and December 24 are based upon interesting parts of the Church's Advent tradition known as The O Antiphons.

Fr. William Saunders of the Diocese of Arlington, VA provided the following additional explanation: "The O Antiphons refer to the seven antiphons that are recited (or chanted) preceding the Magnificat during Vespers of the Liturgy of the Hours. They cover the special period of

Advent preparation known as the Octave before Christmas, Dec. 17-23, with Dec. 24 being Christmas Eve and Vespers for that evening being for the Christmas Vigil. The exact origin of the O Antiphons is not known [but, based on certain historical facts] one may conclude that in some fashion the O Antiphons have been part of our liturgical tradition since the very early Church.

The importance of O Antiphons is twofold: Each one highlights a title for the Messiah: O Sapientia (O Wisdom), O Adonai (O Lord), O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse), O Clavis David (O Key of David), O Oriens (O Rising Sun), O Rex Gentium (O King of the Nations), and O Emmanuel. Also, each one refers to the prophecy of Isaiah of the coming of the Messiah.

According to Professor Robert Greenberg of the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, the Benedictine monks arranged these antiphons with a definite purpose. If one starts with the last title and takes the first letter of each one – Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia – the Latin words *ero eras* are formed, meaning, 'Tomorrow, I will come'. Therefore, the Lord Jesus, whose coming we have prepared for in Advent and whom we have addressed in these seven Messianic / titles, now speaks to us, 'Tomorrow, I will come.' So the O Antiphons not only bring intensity to our Advent preparation, but bring it to a joyful conclusion." (Saunders, Rev. William. "What are the O Antiphons?" *Arlington Catholic Herald* 2003.)



Scripture Insights

This Sunday's readings:

[*Isaiah 61:1-2a, 10-11; 1 Thessalonians 5:16-24; Gospel: John 1:6-8, 19-28*](#)

"Although Jesus had not yet begun his public ministry, John knew that Jesus was the Messiah. And it was John's mission to prepare other people to recognize that fact. John and Jesus had first "met" in utero when Mary visited Elizabeth. Even from that early moment, John understood the significance of encountering Jesus. The Gospel of Luke tells us that the baby "leaped for joy" in Elizabeth's womb when the expectant Mary approached. Now that these two babies were grown men, John was still in the business of recognizing Jesus' significance. He describes His cousin as "the one who is coming after me, whose sandal strap I am not worthy to untie." John knew that Jesus was something special. And he made it his goal to lead others to the same realization.

Of course, as Christians in the twenty-first century, we already know that Jesus is the Messiah. But John's words still raise an important question for us today: Do we recognize the real significance of Jesus? Do we take him for granted, or do we appreciate the gift of salvation that he offers us? Today's Gospel reading tells us that John came 'to testify to the light.' Do we let the light of Christ guide our way? Today as we light the third candle on the Advent wreath, we would do well to reflect on the true light that came down from heaven."

THE DARKNESS BEFORE DAWN

Today, we celebrate Gaudete Sunday with refrains of rejoicing. On Thursday, we'll begin to pray the O Antiphons — seven days to laud the fast-approaching Messiah. (See "Fr. Larry's Note" in this bulletin.) What to make of this in-between time, when scripture shows Jesus chiding religious leaders and Old Testament prophets preach fire and brimstone? "The day in which we now find ourselves is still night," wrote Saint Augustine. But the promise of salvation is sure. "Keep your attention closely fixed on it, as you would on a lamp shining in a dark place until the first streaks of dawn appear."

USHER IN A RENEWED ADVENT

This Advent season is so different from any other in our lifetimes, and the holidays may not allow for worship in person with our faith communities or celebrations with beloved families. For many of us, this brings sadness to these Advent days as we mourn the loss of familiar rituals. The poetic words of theologian, educator, and civil rights leader Howard Thurman remind us that the work of Christmas is to "find the lost, heal the broken, feed the hungry... rebuild the nations and bring peace among others." Let us pray for the grace to overcome any disappointment we feel and focus on feeding the hungry, having compassion for the broken, and rebuilding the relationships around us. In such practices, we will find Advent hope and peace.


