A Note From Fr. Larry

It was our pleasure to welcome them as our parish's newest Catholic Christians and to congratulate their parents, godparents, grandparents, and loved ones for bringing these two beautiful children into God's family.

Monday, September 7, is **Labor Day**. It is secular Holiday, but we will have prayers appropriate for the day at our 9 a.m. Mass. A happy and safe Labor Day Weekend to all.

Tuesday, September 8 is the **Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary**. Saturday, September 12 is the **Memorial of Mary's Most Holy Name**. Please join us for the 9 a.m. Mass and Rosary on each day.

Catholic Bishops call for September 9 as a day of Fasting and Prayer: Bishop Sheldon Fabre, Chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee Against Racism, issued the following statement concerning the August 22 shooting (and its aftermath) of Jacob Blake in Kenosha, Wisconsin: "In the midst of our country's ongoing racial unrest, we [The U.S. Catholic Bishops] restate our commitment to peacefully seeking racial justice. We stand in solidarity with Archbishop Jerome E. ListECKI of Milwaukee, which serves the City of Kenosha, who earlier this week said, 'Violence can never be the means to attain peace and justice. The Church stands as a beacon of hope. The sins of violence, injustice, racism, and hatred must be purged from our communities with acts of mercy, with the protection and care for the dignity of every human person, with respect for the common good, and with an unwavering pursuit of equality and peace.'" The Catholic Bishops urge the faithful to observe Wednesday, September 9, the Memorial of St. Peter Claver, as a day of fasting and prayer for an end to the sin of racism and to the violence associated with that sin. At, and immediately after, our live-streamed 9 a.m. Mass here at HNJ Parish on Wednesday, September 9, we will offer appropriate prayers in line with the Bishops' request.

Friday, September 11, 9 a.m. School Reopening and 9/11/2001 Memorial Mass: St. Joseph the Worker Catholic Academy is (as of now) scheduled to reopen on September 9. Friday, September 11 is the 19th Anniversary of the Terrorist Attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon on September 11, 2001. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, our 9 a.m. live-streamed Friday Mass will be both our School Reopening Mass and our 9/11/2001 Memorial Mass. A few students will be present in the Church, representing the rest of the Academy students who will be watching the Mass in their classrooms via live-stream on Holy Name Brooklyn's Facebook page. After Mass, the SJWCA students (those in the Church and those watching via live-stream) will join me for a modified version of the 9/11 Memorial Prayer Service we conduct each year. Everyone is, of course, welcome to join us for this Mass and the Prayer Service.

Update on the 2020 Annual Catholic Appeal: The public phase of the 2020 ACA will lessen in September. As reported elsewhere in this bulletin, we are still \$30,000 and 62 donors behind where we were in the 2019 Appeal. Many of you probably still have pledge materials at home awaiting your decision.

Pledges made now are especially important because 100% of all dollars pledged now will come back to HNJ Parish to help us pay down our still large debt obligation. Please help us with a pledge if you can. God bless you for your generosity.



Scripture Insights

Please consider the following commentary on this Sunday's readings (Ezekiel 33:7-9; Romans 13:8-10; Gospel: Matthew 18:15-20):

"CHALLENGE IN COMMUNITY

Community life, whether in a family, intentional grouping, religious congregation, or the church itself, is the great testing ground of faith. St. Teresa of Avila thought that relationships in community were often a greater indication of one's relationship to God than the heights of mystical prayer.

Paul reminds his Roman audience that love, tested in immediate relationship with our neighbor, is the fulfillment of all laws. Even dramatic sins of adultery, murder, and stealing are variations of the more domestic betrayals of deception, manipulation, and egotism.

In each case it is a lack of love, a harming of the neighbor, that occurs. This is why our one duty, our sole "debt," is to love one another.

Today's Gospel provides a practical scenario on community relations:

'If your brother should commit some wrong against you, go and point out his fault, but keep it between the two of you. ... If he does not listen, summon another, so that every case may stand on the word of two or three witnesses.'

Only after these careful encounters is the conflict to be referred to the entire church. Then, if recalcitrance persists, there is separation.

Sounds simple enough.

The problem is, it depends upon behaviors that do not come easily. We don't often enjoy directly confronting another person, especially someone with whom we are having difficulties.

Some families will go years before addressing a problem. Grudges or resentments within a community more often die with those who hold them rather than come to resolution in quiet conversation. Misdeeds of friends or relatives are usually discussed with anyone but the accused.

Encountering the truth with another person daunts us because it makes us face another being who cannot be reduced to our own desires or projections. We may try to make others a function of our egos, but it fails. Rather than enter the struggle, we ignore it.

If, however, we seriously love another person as an 'other,' and not a mere instrument of our wills, we experience the kind of self-transcendence that is required in our relationship to God.

Is it any wonder, then, that what we bind and loose on earth is somehow bound and loosed eternally? Our human relationships mirror our relationship with God. Whenever we encounter each other—not only in prayer—Jesus is in our midst."
