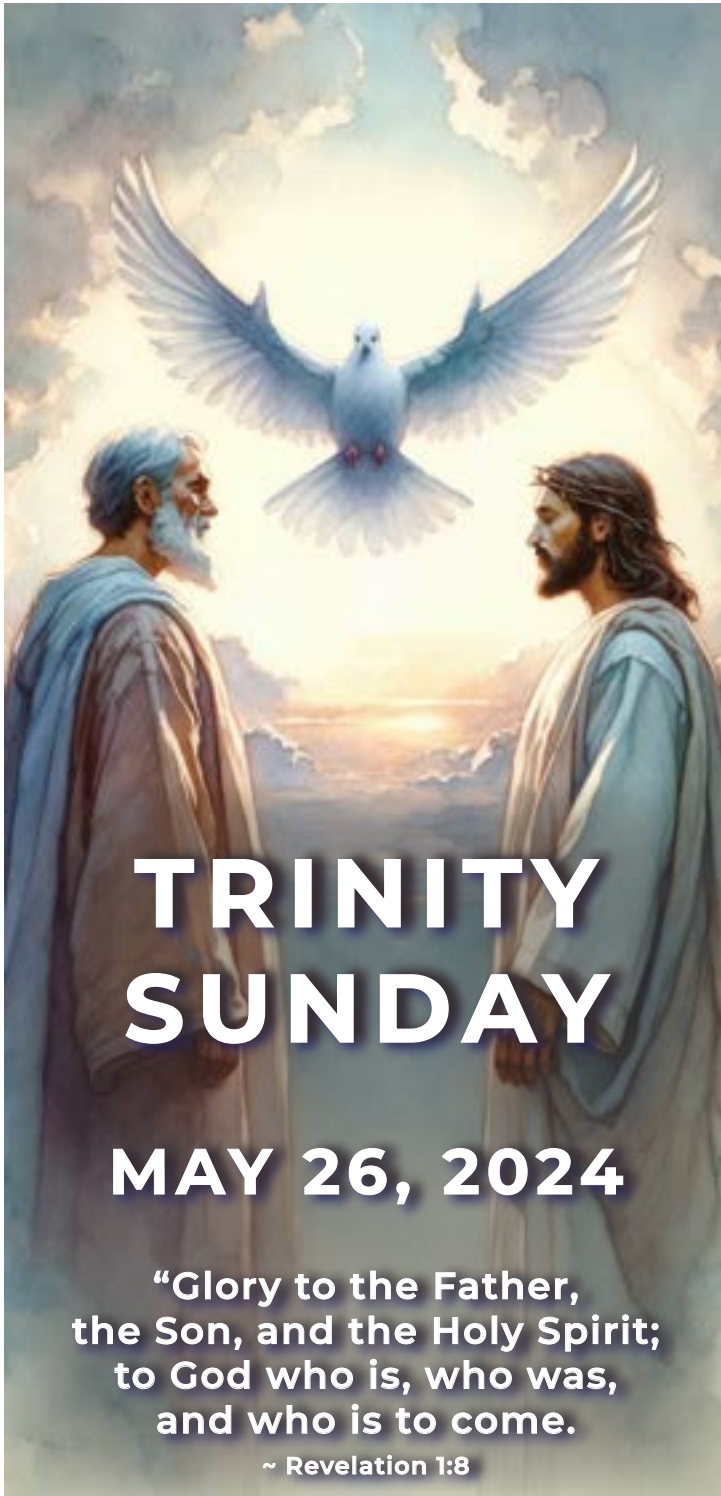

A NOTE FROM FR. LARRY

Last Sunday, May 19, was an extra special Pentecost Sunday at HNJ Parish. Bishop James Massa presided at our Noon Mass of Thanksgiving which was followed by four hours of music, food and fellowship in Shepherds Hall and the School Yard as we celebrated the 10th Anniversary of our Church's Restoration and the 145th Anniversary of our Parish's Founding. Almost 400 current and former parishioners, friends of the parish, and clergy and religious with ties to the parish attended. We were blessed with perfect weather. I am very, very grateful to the many volunteers for their long hours spent planning—and so successfully carrying out—the details for this wonderful day.

I would like to include two quotes that reflect the spiritual and celebratory themes of the day. The first is the Collect, or Opening Prayer, for the *Mass for the Anniversary of the Dedication of a Church*. Bishop Massa of course used the required Mass prayers for Pentecost, but as permitted, he used the following prayer to conclude the Intercessions because it reflected so well our hopes and prayers as we remembered the 10th anniversary of the 2014 redication of our Church following its extensive restoration:

“O God, who year by year renew for us the day when this your holy temple was consecrated, hear the prayers of your people and grant that in this place for you there may always be pure worship and for us, fullness of redemption. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, Who lives and reigns with you In the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.”

The second quote is a poem entitled “Our Own Holy Nation” written by long-time (and very talented) HNJ parishioner Jim O’Dea. Jim recited the poem at the opening of our post-Mass festivities, and I believe it incorporates well the 145 Year history of our parish that we were remembering and celebrating on Sunday:

In addition to our Anniversary Celebration, this Pentecost weekend was also when I had the privilege of administering the Sacrament of Confirmation to Dakota Bastidas, Arriel Borrero, Yaneeth Rocio Arevalo, and Ana Deli Zavaleta Aquilar. Congratulations to them and to their loved ones. Many thanks to their instructors, Maryellen Keogh and Ana Acosta. Please remember that the Church welcomes those who did not receive the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, First Holy Communion and Confirmation) as a child to receive those sacraments later in life. Please contact the Rectory for further information.

This Sunday, May 26, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. The mystery of the Holy Trinity (in the one true God, there are three distinct persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit) is impossible for us to understand fully. However, love is at the core of that mystery: the mutual love that the Father has for the Son and that the Son has for the Father generates a distinct third divine person, the Holy Spirit. God generously extends that divine love to us. In baptism, we were given a share in the life of God, which is a life of love. The expectation is that we will accept that gift by living up to the two great commandments of love of God and love of neighbor. Trinity Sunday is an opportunity for each of us to consider how well we are doing in living up to that expectation.

Looking More Closely at the Word

SHARING HIS LIFE

The political campaigns for the General Election have reminded us how hard it is to get across any sort of message. Whether it is good news or something disagreeable makes little difference to the impact it has on the general public. Even the happiest or the most shocking of events remain in our memories for a very short time. When we are involved personally, however, events can change us. Such happenings are not like the television news that appears on a screen but often we are changed by the course of events in our lives. That is the way it is with the Christian message, the Good News. It is news that involves every one of us in a personal way.

The mystery of the Holy Trinity that we celebrate today is not only a great feast of the Christian year but one of the most exciting as well. It is great because it glorifies God in his three persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It is exciting for us, God's people, because the doctrine of the Blessed Trinity reveals to us the extent of God's involvement with his creation. What we learn is that God wishes to share his life with us and has sent his Son, God's love made visible for us, so that we may have access to the Father. But God did not leave us entirely to our own devices; Jesus as a special gift to the church has given that Spirit that has inhabited the world since it first moved over the waters at creation. It is that same Spirit that lives in each of us who have accepted that gift at Baptism and Confirmation. It is that same Spirit that prays in us through

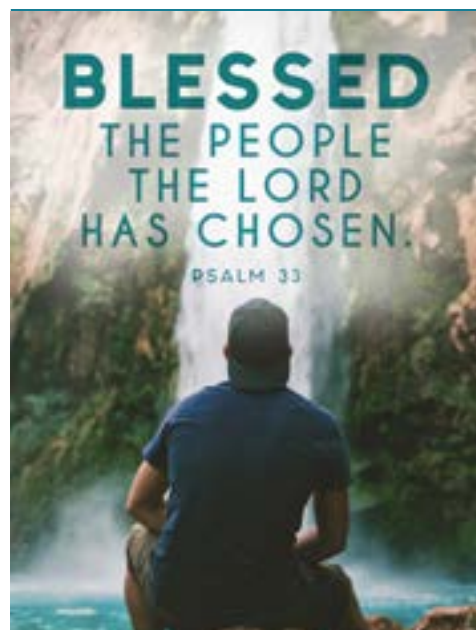
the Son to the Father.

So, when we glorify God in the Blessed Trinity we are thanking him for drawing us into his life. Our God enfolds us in his love and draws us into eternal relationship with him. This feast of the Blessed Trinity is not, therefore, simply about God and his internal life. If it were it would probably make little difference to us. When we celebrate three Persons in one God we are rejoicing in the fact that God freely chose to reach down to his creatures to redeem us, to show his love for us and to offer us eternal life.

Just think for a moment what a different place the world would be if all people were able to accept the Good News contained in the teaching of Jesus. Even allowing for the fact that our redemption has yet to reach fulfilment we would be well on the way to overcoming the divisions that cause each of us so much pain and despair.

Every one of us is called by God to share in his life, the life of the Blessed Trinity. We are also called to share this with others who do not know God. Some are called to a particular way of life such as marriage or religious life. Others are called to a particular work that witnesses to the love of Jesus in the world. Teachers, doctors, artists, businessmen, and factory workers, for example, who make Christ alive in their own lives, carry the brunt of bringing the Good News to the world.

One special calling is that of the priest. The function of the priest in offering the Sacrifice of the Mass, reconciling those who have drifted away from God, and preaching the Good news is indispensable for our church.

BE PART OF THE PILGRIMAGE

MAY 26 & 27, 2024

May through July, 2024 is the time for the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage during which pilgrims are processing with the exposed Blessed Sacrament along four separate routes crossing several parts of the United States and converging at the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis in July.

The Northeastern (or “St. Elizabeth Ann Seton”) route will pass through several nearby Brooklyn parishes on Sunday and Monday, May 26/27. We are invited to walk briefly with the pilgrims or to meet and pray with them before the Eucharist at the times and stops below.
